IT took just three hours to sell all 31 apartments at the exclusive sales launch of The Post apartments on Saturday.

N G Farah Project Marketing's managing director Dennis Vertzayias and his team had put in the hard yards in the five weeks leading up to the launch.

"The owners were over the moon with the result as they not only sold the whole building by volume but also sold well above the suburb's average," Mr Vertzayias said.

"Sales ranged from a onebedroom unit which sold for \$539,000 right through to several \$1.2 million-plus sales for some three bedroom units. The average sales price was \$765,000 – well above the suburb's median of \$581,000," he said.
